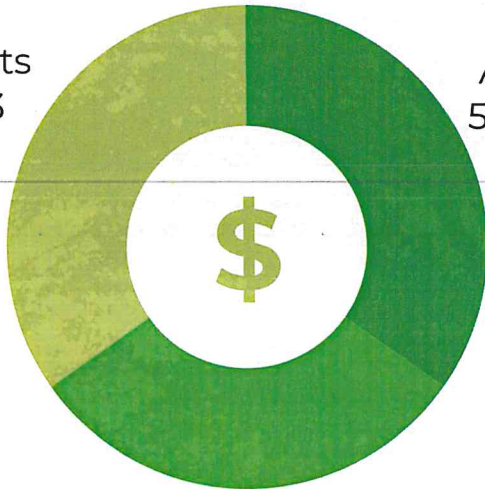

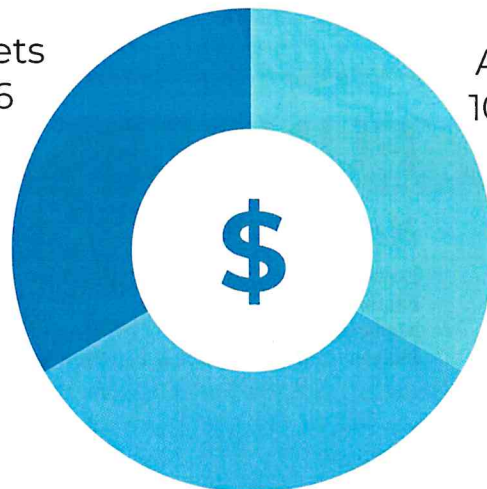

PICNIC IN THE PARK

NECRC hosted the 22nd annual Picnic in the Park event in partnership with the 14th No Stone Unturned Concert and vigil for Missing and Murdered Manitobans in St. John's Park. This was a free event with a variety of activities including face painting, 3 bouncy houses, snow cones, cotton candy, pop corn and two meals were available to community members for free. 15 resource tables were hosted by community based organizations. There was live entertainment from 1 PM - 10:30 PM and ended with a fireworks show. Approximately 3000 people attended.

SAFETY FEAST

NECRC held the Safety Feast at Turtle Island Neighbourhood Centre. Over 150 residents enjoyed their feast. A survey was distributed to all who attended which allowed us to gather feedback related to perceptions of safety in the area what future safety initiatives they would like to see happening.

NORTH END RESIDENTS COALITION

Plans are in the works to bring together the different North End Residents associations so we can better support the work of our resident led organizations. In the coming year we plan on bringing the group together quarterly for networking and cross neighbourhood promotion of events and opportunities. If you or your group would like to join, please reach out to us!

RECREATION

Recreation Grant of \$500.00 was given to the William Whyte Neighbourhood Association to host a Basketball Clinic. The one-day clinic seen 44 youth with 4 instructors and each participant was given a basketball to keep at the end.

We are currently working with the North End Historical Society and The University of Manitoba to develop a plan for The Palace Theatre and ensure community interests are well represented.

We are on the Winnipeg ParticiPark Advisory Committee to design the park outside Sargent Tommy Prince Place on the Old Ex campus.

COMMUNITY CLEAN-UPS

NECRC supported 4 community spring clean-ups. Each event had 20-50 community members participate. We donated a garden prize pack at each event. We also helped facilitate the Lord Selkirk Resource Centre's community clean-up and BBQ which served 300 hot dogs and hamburgers to community members.

NORTH END FARMERS MARKET

NECRC hired 1 Green team student to assist with the North End Farmers Market which served approximately 25 residents every Friday from mid-June until the end of August. The NEFM had on average 4 local vendors selling goods and NECRC Provided the tables, chairs, and canopies.

In 2022, we partnered with Fireweed Food Co-op to bring low cost, farm fresh fruits and vegetables to the North End.

HAMPERS

6 community members were hired for short-term employment to help pack and deliver 100 food hampers in February 2023. These hampers were distributed to community members and contained a variety of non perishable items and a \$25 gift card for Superstore. 60 emergency food hampers were made and given to NECRC clients throughout the year. These hampers included a vegetable chili, ready to eat soup, juice a can of fruit, cookies and other items.

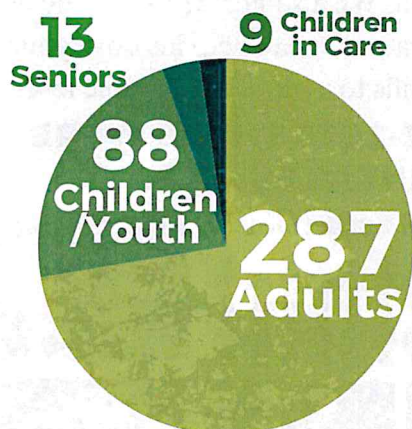

The Tenant Landlord Cooperation Program (TLC) provided direct advocacy to help individuals and landlords understand their rights and responsibilities as they relate to rental issues.



RAISING THE ROOF



NECRC participated in Raise the Roof toque sales raising \$2,415. We were able to distribute 161 toques to community members experiencing homelessness during the winter months. Distribution of the toques occurred in partnership with Ogijita Pimatiswin Kinamatwin and Mama Bear Clan Patrol.



We also host the **Gateway to Learning** program that can help improve your 9 essential skills to a more employable level.

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BCMP is a NECRC employment development program carried out in partnership with Manitoba Housing

BCMP is supported by Workplace Education Manitoba, which supplies a trades based teacher for 40 sessions/60 hours of training annually.

In 2022-2023 Manitoba Housing hired 4 trainees, 1 clerk and 3 superintendents trained by BCMP.
